

# Deep River

for Piano

Slowly and Expressively

Improvisation\*

\*Bring the piece to a close through the following improvisation scheme:

1. Improvise over the melody in bar 38 to 39 (including the pickup to bar 38) three more times in the same range of the piano as that in bar 38 to 39.
  2. Then improvise over the same melody four times in the treble range of the piano, playing more reflectively.
  3. Then move hands down to the mid range of the piano and improvise over the same melody four times, more expressively than in step 2.
  4. Finally, play the same melody four more times, with the left hand playing only IV-V-I bass notes (in harmonic rhythm) in the low C range, dropping out a few notes gradually to create the effect of fading away.
  5. Close with the following cadence:
